**DIRECTIONS** – You will analyze (study) an artwork from the *Masters of the American West Art Exhibition and Sale* by visiting <u>Masters.theautry.org</u>. Click on <u>ONLINE CATALOG</u> at the top of the webpage or hover your cursor over the images and click on the image that says <u>ONLINE CATALOG</u>. Look through the artwork. Pick your favorite artwork to analyze by clicking on the image of the artwork. Then follow the steps below.

**STEP A** – Look closely at the artwork you picked without reading the information below the artwork. Then describe the artwork by answering the questions in the chart below. Write your answers in the space provided or on a separate document.
