The Autry Museum of the American West Presents Native Voices and the Premiere of *Where the Summit Meets the Stars* by Frank Henry Kaash Katasse (Tlingit)

(September 8, 2023 - Los Angeles, CA)— The Autry Museum of the American West presents the only Equity theatre company dedicated exclusively to developing and producing new work by Native artists, <u>Native Voices</u> and its premiere of <u>Where the Summit Meets the Stars</u> by Frank Henry Kaash Katasse.

When a near-death experience derails her flight through Southeast Alaska, Rose awakens to find herself in the care of the kind stranger who pulled her to safety. As they journey by boat through the darkness and fog, Rose untangles the mysteries of her past, questions the world around her and comes to an inescapable crossroads. *Where the Summit Meets the Stars* is an ethereal Alaska Native story driven by music, dance and the culture of the Tlingit people.

Artistic Director DeLanna Studi knows the immense value of Native Voices thanks to the theater company, Southern Californians are offered an intimate audience experience with the exciting voices and rich stories of Native artists, stories which are often complex and layered. "Native stories are often not linear," Studi says, "containing multiple planes, multiple beginnings and endings, multiple ancestral, environmental or cosmological characters, all existing, interweaving and overlapping simultaneously."

Where the Summit Meets the Stars places the audience as passengers aboard a spiritual vessel on a journey in which one Alaskan woman must decide the fates of herself and her family. An open and honest exploration of love and autonomy, Where the Summit Meets the Stars asks us to

consider: would we make one choice that could determine everything, or would we risk it all for the opportunity to make a thousand more choices?

PLAYWRIGHT | <u>Frank Henry Kaash Katasse</u> [he/him] is Tlingít from the Tsaagweidí clan. He is an Emmy Nominated writer as well as an actor, author, director, producer, improviser, educator and playwright. He received his bachelor's degree in theatre arts from the University of Hawaii: Mānoa. Katasse lives and works in Douglas, Alaska and has worked on numerous productions at Perseverance Theatre. He made his professional playwriting debut with Native Voices in 2016 with *They Don't Talk Back*, which premiered at the Autry, La Jolla Playhouse and Perseverance.

DIRECTOR | <u>DeLanna Studi</u> [she/her] is an enrolled member of the Cherokee Nation and has more than 25 years of experience as a performer, storyteller, educator, facilitator, advocate and activist. Her theatre credits include the first national Broadway tour of the Tony Award and Pulitzer Prize-winning play *August: Osage County*, off-Broadway's *Gloria: A Life* (Daryl Roth Theatre), *Informed Consent* (the Duke on 42nd Street) and regional theatres (Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Portland Center Stage, Cornerstone and Indiana Repertory Theatre). Studi originated roles in more than 18 world premieres including 14 Native productions. A pivotal moment in her career was writing and performing *And So We Walked: An*

Artist's Journey Along the Trail of Tears, based on retracing her family's footsteps along the Trail of Tears with her father. And So We Walked has been produced throughout the country and was the first American play chosen for the Journées Théâtrales de Carthage in Tunisia, Africa. Last year, it made its Off-Broadway debut at Minetta Lane where it was recorded for Audible. In film and television, Studi stars in the Peabody award–winning Edge of America; Hallmark's Dreamkeeper, Goliath, Shameless and General Hospital. She is a 2022 USA Fellow, a recipient of the Butcher Scholar Award, a MAP Fund Grant, a Cherokee Preservation Grant and the Doris Duke Performing Artist Fund. Since 2007, she has served as chair of the SAG-AFTRA National Native Americans Committee.





DIRECTOR | <u>Matthew Burgos</u> [he/him] has been an educator, director and playwright for over 20 years, having directed numerous award-winning regional theater productions in Los Angeles and Atlanta. Former artistic director of Vanguard Rep and chair of the Department of Theater at Mt. San Antonio College, Burgos has prioritized mentoring and collaborating with artists from marginalized communities and has worked diligently to shape affiliated organizations into more inclusive and allied artistic communities. Burgos is truly honored to be working again with Native

Voices and the Autry, having created workshops and worked on an exhibit in the past. He would like to thank DeLanna Studi, Frank Henry Kaash Katasse and Elisa Blandford for the opportunity to work with the artists and community of Native Voices and genuinely appreciates their continued trust and support.



ROSE | Josephine Keefes [she/her] is an enrolled member of the Nez Perce tribe and theatre artist residing in the Pacific Northwest. She has worked professionally as an actor for both stage and film, director and professor of theatre arts for over a decade. Some of her credits include *A Christmas Carol* (ACT Seattle), *Sovereignty* (Harlequin Productions), *Bug* (Civic Theatre), and *The Psychic Life of Savages* (LATC). She received her MFA from UCLA School of Theatre, Film and Television and her BFA from The Theatre School at DePaul University. She thanks her two kids and her partner for their unwavering love and support!



JOHN | <u>Duane Minard</u> [he/him] is a California Native American originating from the Paiute Reservation in Bishop, California. He is an enrolled member of the Yurok Nation. Some of his theater credits include *Lying with Badgers, They Don't Talk Back, Off the Rails, Ramona* (19 seasons) and *The Bad Seed*. Minard is also a playwright, Native dance choreographer and Native drummer and dancer. He is currently in postproduction of a new full-length Native film, *A Christmas in Ochopee*.



ANTHONY | <u>Kholan Studi</u> [he/him] is an enrolled member of the Cherokee Nation and was born and raised in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Ever since he was a child, he has loved entertaining folks and making them laugh and feel. In 2012, Studi moved to Los Angeles to attend the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, where he completed his studies in 2015. Since then, he has worked in many productions with Native Voices, including *They Don't Talk Back* by Frank Henry Kaash Katasse and *Bingo Hall* by Dillon Chitto. Studi was also honored to play Elias Boudinot in a production of *Sovereignty* by Mary Kathryn Nagle at Marin Theatre

Company in 2019. During the pandemic, he took part in Perseverance Theatre's production of *Spirit of the Valley* by Frank Henry Kaash Katasse and lent his voice to Native Voices' *The Adventures of Super Indian* by Arigon Starr. In 2022, Studi was an understudy for *Between 2*

Who You Calling 'Stoic'? Not Your Cigar Store Indian

There are many stereotypes that Native Americans—living and dead—have had to contend with. One of the most pervasive in film, history *and* wooden statues is the stoic, wise leader. He never smiles. He rarely speaks. He is always a *he*. So Native Voices asked playwrights to dive into this image of the "Stoic Indian" and flip the stereotype on its head. Selected plays will be performed onstage at the Autry and will be entered to win the Thomas Studie Gadugi Audience Prize of \$500 and the Von Marie Atchley Excellence in Playwriting Award of \$1,000.

Young Native Playwrights Festival | June 8-9, 2024

Storytelling is a way to preserve culture and language, which is why Native Voices is thrilled to bring back its Young Native Playwrights program, but this time with a post-pandemic twist! With the help of Zoom, Native youth from across Turtle Island will participate in an eight-week playwriting course that will nourish, elevate and amplify their voices. Plays written will be performed live onstage at the Autry, as well as livestreamed, so that these Young Playwrights, their families and their communities can see that their voice is valid and their stories matter.

30th Festival of New Plays | August 2024

Celebrate 30 years of new Native plays with us! A cornerstone of the American theatre, Native Voices continues to cultivate opportunities for Native playwrights. As part of a 10-day residency, playwrights are partnered with an artistic team and company of actors to explore their scripts and continue the cultural conversation of what it is to be Native in 2024.

About Native Voices

Native Voices places Native narratives at the center of the American story in order to facilitate a more inclusive dialogue on what it means to be American. Founded in 1994 by Randy Reinholz (Choctaw) and Jean Bruce Scott, Native Voices is dedicated to the development and production of new works for the stage written by American Indian, Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian, and First Nations playwrights. The organization remains committed to emerging and established Native playwrights and theatre artists, to telling Native stories by and about Native people, and to providing the public access to these plays and playwrights—all with the goals of fostering greater understanding and respect of showcasing artistic voices that might otherwise not be heard.
